#### Virginia Joins the VFW Action Corps



Since our founding in 1899, one of the major focus areas for

the VFW has been legislative activism. At the state's Fall Council of Administration meeting a motion was unanimously passed to add every member of the Department of Virginia with a listed email to the VFW's Action Corps.

The Action Corps is the VFW's national grassroots advocacy network comprised of more than 45,000 VFW members and patriotic supporters of veterans. Members of the VFW Action Corps stay up-to-date on the issues facing our veterans, our military and their families, standing ready to email, write, call and visit our nation's lawmakers to make their voices heard. The VFW Action Corps is free and open to all patriotic Americans who care about the military and veterans' communities. Action Corps members receive the Action Corps Weekly, an easy-to-read electronic newsletter that highlights the VFW's advocacy efforts on Capitol Hill and immediate access to a nationwide database of contact information for all elected officials.

However, an important part of this program are the "Action Alerts" telling members how they can get involved when our nation's veterans, service members, and their families need

#### Home Depot grant helps Manassas veteran make his home ADA compliant

Michael Towne, a Gulf War veteran and life member of Post 7589 has become wheelchair dependent due to a service related spinal injury. His home in Manassas presents him difficulty because it was not built with consideration for persons with disabil-

While shopping at the East Manassas Home Depot his wife Agnes mentioned to a clerk that she was having difficulty making their home ADA compliant. The clerk took her to a supervisor who took the necessary information and told Agnes she would send it to the Warrenton Store. Home Depot has a policy for assisting families and Vets. Agnes explained that the Manassas Home Depot stores and others in the area participate in these projects and that the store in Warrenton is a Regional facility and "We're a team and it feels good to help". thus responsible for coordinating these projects.

The project was approved and funded with a \$10,000 Home Depot grant. Working with VFW Post 7589 and its Auxiliary, the funds were presented to the manager of the Warrenton Home Depot on October 8. According to

manager Wayne Johnson the construction would begin on October 22 when approximately 25 to 30 Home Depot workers will be there to donate their time and skills.

Auxiliary President Mary Corkhill stated that the Auxiliary, with assistance from the Post, will provide lunches and refreshments for the workers. The Auxiliary also offered to cover any unexpected expenses while Department of Virginia Military Services Chair Ron Link explores an unmet need request with National VFW.

On the morning of October 22 a groundbreaking ceremony was held at the Towne's home. State Surgeon Rick Raskin and State Auxiliary President Georgette Dausey represented the Depart-

ment of Virginia. Also attending were Auxiliary President Mary Corkhill, Auxiliary members Yvonne Sullivan and Ann Mitchell. Comrades were represented by Post Commander Pete

MacLeod and National Veterans Services team member Ron

The 30 members of Team Home Depot were led by Wayne Johnson and promptly began excavating for entry ramps to the front and rear doors. Additional items included in this project are widening of interior doors to 36", accessible cabinetry and making the deck handicapped accessible.

The Auxiliary provided snacks and lunch for the workers with financial assistance from the comrades.

Home Depot also is doing a project for another Manassas veteran who suffers from Traumatic Brain Injury. For that project Team Home Depot is installing tiles so that the floors are easier for him to navigate.

It is important to note that all of the Team Home Depot volunteers donate their skills and their time for such worthy projects. As one of the volunteers working on the Townes' project said

Veterans needing assistance with similar needs are encouraged to contact a Home Depot manager to see if they qualify and to initiate a request.

their voices heard on Capitol Hill. State Judge Advocate Ken Wiseman, who also serves as the Action Corps Manager as a member of our National Legislative Service staff in Washington, D.C. highlighted the importance of these alerts. "Action Corps members are the lions roar for the VFW. More than 30,000 emails were sent which pressured Congress to repeal COLA penalties for military retirees and more than 15,000 emails helped protect the Purple Heart's dignity and stature when the Pentagon tried to establish a new medal." Ken further cited the importance of the Action Corps with the unanimous vote of the House of Representatives to protect tuition assistance for those still in the military. "VFW members made that happen by bombarding Congressional offices with emails. No other advocacy organization of any type can say that".

The VFW Action Corps is what gives the VFW its strength in advocating for our nation's heroes. Working hand-in-hand with the VFW's National Legislative Service -- whose office is in eye-shot of the Capitol dome in Washington -- members of the VFW Action Corps are armed with all of the tools and information they need to help the VFW in its mission to support our nation's veterans. State Judge Advocate Ken Wiseman summed it up best: "Virginia now has more Action Corps members than any other state. Virginia's veterans vote and an email from the Action Corps today is a reminder that Congress will be held accountable on Election Day."

#### Young Guns honor fallen N.C. solider

It's often been said war knows no boundaries. Recently, the Young Guns Committee of the Grover King VFW Post 1115 proved that neither do they.

The Young Guns, a newly formed group of post-Vietnam era veterans, recently traveled across state lines to honor a fallen soldier from Elkin, N.C. On April 28, four members of the Young Guns Committee and VFW Post Commander Howard Minton met with members of Mark Garner VFW Post 7794 in Elkin to induct the post's namesake posthumously as an honorary member of the Young Guns.

A Captain in the Army Rangers, Garner was killed at the age of 30 on July 6, 2009 in Afghanistan. Garner was traveling as a passenger in an M-1151 Humvee with a convoy of U.S. Navy Explosive Ordnance Disposal specialists when the vehicle struck an improvised explosive device.

"We read about Mark in the VFW magazine, and as a committee we decided we needed to go down and tell them we thought it was an awesome idea they changed the Post's name in his honor," said Mike Lara, President of the Young Guns Committee. "We also wanted to honor his mother."

Lara and fellow Young Guns Marty Rivera, Doug Barnes and Gary Adams joined Minton in meeting members of the Elkin VFW Post at the Fairfield Inn. There, the Young Guns gave a presentation about the group and what they were about. At the end, the Young Guns presented Garner's mother, Beth Garner, with a Young Guns hoodie and hat, and made the late Army Captain an honorary Young Guns member.

"That meant a lot to us that we were able to do that because we were honoring a fallen soldier. He would have been eligible to be a Young Guns member," Lara said. "It meant a lot to us because it is not every day you hear about a story that is so close to home. We are trying to show that we not only take care of the veterans at home, but veterans all over the place."

Lara said the Young Guns conducted the ceremony in the same manner as a military funeral, presenting Garner's mother with the hoodie and hat the same way as a folded flag would be presented. They concluded with the "military funeral salute."

"We told her in honor of Grover King Post 1115, we honor you with the official uniform of the VFW Young Guns in honor of

your son," Lara said. "It was very ceremonial and emotional. His mom gave us all hugs and thanked us so much for honoring her son. We made some great contacts there and we are going to try to go back to Elkin and start a Young Guns committee. When that committee is formed, Mark Garner will be the founder of that committee."

Joseph Hicks, Post commander of the Mark Garner VFW Post 7794 in Elkin, said the Post changed the name to honor the recently fallen soldier. But it's also a way to bring attention to younger veterans, he said, which ties in to what the Young Guns are all about - trying to encourage new people to join the VFW. Hicks said the Hillsville Young Guns is planning to talk to all of North Carolina's District 11 in the near future.

When the name of the Elkin Post was changed to honor Mark Garner, Hicks said all the original charter members names were left on the plaque. Those founders were all World War II veterans who established the post on June 6, 1946, exactly one year after the D-Day landings in Normandy, France. Hicks believes the Young Guns hold many of the same ideals of those founders.

"These guys came home and sort of like the Young Guns, they come back and now have all these memories. I think it was the president of the group talking about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder being a big thing. It was then, too, but they had no help for those guys," Hicks said. "They were wanting some place to be together, a lot of them never wanted to talk about any of this, but they probably would share with each other in a brotherhood. This is what the Young Guns do now. They have all been there and so they are our brothers."

Beth Garner said serving the United States was something her son was extremely proud to do. He also would have been proud to be a part of the Young Guns, she said.

"I told them that Mark would have been very pleased. It is a very worthwhile project. It was just such an honor," she said. "They were talking about how they wanted to help other young men and women who had been in the military. I thought it was so good they were talking about those that had PTSD, that it would be so good to have members of the military that had done the same thing and talk to them. Those who haven't been there just can't understand fully what it must be like to be in battle."

#### 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Run-Walk to Remember

On Saturday morning, April 18, over 1,000 men, women and children, including 600 active duty soldiers from Fort Lee and other service personnel, gathered at the Virginia War Memorial in Richmond for the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Run-Walk to Remember sponsored by VFW Posts 637 of Hopewell and 6364 in Richmond.

The Virginia War Memorial is the state's official tribute to the over 12,000 Virginians who died in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, the Persian Gulf and the Global War on Terrorism. The Memorial is located on over four acres in downtown Richmond near the James River.

The basic mission of the Virginia War Memorial and the 5K Run-Walk is to honor and remember the service and sacrifice of all veterans and today's active military. The 5K also helps raise funds for the Memorial's Educational Foundation which finances the over 50 educational and patriotic events and programs held there each year.



"The Virginia War Memorial is dedicated to the same principles as the VFW," said Mike Dunham, Commander of Post 6364. "When the Memorial asked us if we could help provide volunteers for the 5K, we immediately said yes. Then, we realized that they relied on sponsors to pay for the costs in putting on the race. We decided that this was the perfect event to also give our financial support."

Commander Dunham approached Commander Phil Arundsen at Post 637 with the idea and they presented the proposal to their members who wholeheartedly gave their support. Other 5K sponsors included major corporations, car dealerships, a bank, a college and retail stores. Posts 637 and 6364 decided to sign on as the Platinum Sponsors – which meant the VFW earned naming rights and top billing in all advertising and promotion.

Members of both Posts joined to help coordinate the 5K on race day, set up a tent to promote recognition for VFW and encouraged membership on the Memorial grounds.

"This event is really special," said Commander Arendsen. "It is only the 5K around here where civilians have the opportunity to

run alongside soldiers on the course" adding "the mission of the Virginia War Memorial fits in right beside that of the VFW:

"Honoring our Veterans, Preserving our History, Educating our Youth, and Inspiring Patriotism in All".

"The purpose of this corporation (VFW) shall be fraternal, patriotic, historical, charitable, and educational"

Six different battalion groups from Fort Lee ran the course in formation carrying their colors and led by their commanders. Post 637 is the nearest VFW to the base. The military unit with the most "spirit" was presented a trophy. One of the judges for the award was WWII Navy veteran Herndon Smith, a member of Post 637.

"Teaming with the Virginia War Memorial in this event was also a great way to promote the VFW and the ways we contribute to our community," noted Commander Dunham, who, along with Commander Arundsen, was interviewed by local TV and newspaper reporters.

"Thanks to the VFW, this year's 5K was our best run and most successful ever," said the Virginia War Memorial's Suzanne Feigley who coordinated the event. "We couldn't have done it without the support of Mike, Phil and all the members of both VFW Posts."

Commanders Arundsen and Dunham said that their members are already signed on to repeat as Platinum Sponsors for the Memorial's 2016 5K and they are hoping to interest other VFW Posts in their district to join them.





In particular, he shared the story of Sgt. John Wright, who served under Landers in Afghanistan. Notwithstanding Wright's loss of his legs in an IED explosion, Landers said, "If he were here today, he would jump for joy."

With tears in his eye and a voice choked with emotion, Landers expressed his gratitude to the many volunteers who cared enough to build a place of respite and relaxation for Sgt. Wright and all other wounded warriors.

Because of Island Creek Park, located near Townsville, N.C., Wright and other disabled veterans will be able to enjoy Kerr Lake for themselves without feeling hindered by inaccessible facilities.

Rolling to the front of the crowd in his wheelchair, Robert Satterwhite, a disabled veteran and member of the Paralyzed Veterans of America Mid-Atlantic Region, shared his gratitude for the Island Creek project.

"Being in a wheelchair is not easy," Satterwhite told the crowd. Something as simple as the paved walkway, which zig zags through the park to a 100 percent accessible fishing pier, can make all the difference to a person in a wheelchair.

lar use of the Island Creek park, said that before now, he could not take his son fishing or enjoy a cookout there.

Gravel walkways and bumpy terrain made it nearly impossible for him to maneuver his wheelchair down to the lake and back.

Island Creek has poured concrete walkways that gently slope from a covered picnic pavilion to a fishing pier. The fence surrounding the pier is high enough to ensure the safety of those in a wheelchair, yet low enough that they can comfortably fish.

A second pathway and pad are already in place, waiting for the day when there is enough money raised to install a 4-slip handicapped-accessible boat dock.

Island Creek is the first barrier-free park built on Corps of Engineers' land. The project has been watched closely by the Corps and members of the military who view it as a prototype for similar facilities around the country. The significance of Island Creek Veterans Park brought Brig. Gen. David Turner, commander of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers South Atlantic Division, to the land Dock Service, who built the fishing pier; Harmon Saunders Clarksville area for the dedication.

Virginia is home to nearly 800,000 veterans. Many carry with them the scars of their time in the service, noted John Newby, commissioner of Veterans Services for Virginia. He added that over the next five years, more than one million soldiers will leave the Armed Services. It is expected that the greatest percentage of them will make their home in Virginia. That is why a facility like Island Creek is so important.

Tiffany Smith, an outpatient recreation therapist with the Veterans Administration Clinic in Durham, N.C., said she looks forward to bringing the first group of disabled veterans to the park to go fishing.

The idea for the park began in 2009 with the help of Thomas Loftus, Samuel Hargrove and Tom Riggan. The park was made possible by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, American Legion Post 45 and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8163 in Clarksville.

Loftus, Post Service Officer of American Legion Post 45, referred to the final result of all the work done for the park as Satterwhite, who lives close enough by to be able to make regu- "phenomenal." He said that this was pulled off because we live in a patriotic area of the country. Loftus mentioned that because of the park, veterans will have the opportunity to teach their kids how to fish and enjoy quality family time and do so with no bar-

VFW Post 7589 in Manassas, Virginia is named after a 27th Infantry Division veteran, Francis Cannon, who gave his life and Therefore, the "Last Battle" is a two phased struggle. Phase one whose remains were returned to Virginia soil. Others, however, still lay undiscovered awaiting return to the United States. Knowing this, Post 7589 actively sought a means to repatriate these heroes.

Theater. Originally chartered to find the remains of Japanese servicemen, they became aware that some of the remains they were discovering were those of American servicemen.

Bean of Manassas, Virginia. He was killed in action on July 7, 1944 as a member of the 27<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division during the largest fight. Banzai attack of WWII. 658 US servicemen died in this action.

PFC Bean's remains were returned to Virginia on October 3, 2014 (Virginia Veteran, April 2015) for burial. Following a funeral with full military honors, a color guard comprised of members of Post 7589 and other area Veterans Service Organizations (VSOs) accompanied the family to burial at Quantico National Cemetery.

The story doesn't end here. Other missing servicemen still remain in the South Pacific and the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), Kuentai-USA and others are continuing to



actively search the area. To date Kuentai-USA has positively identified four other sets of remains and six others are pending positive identification.

Since 2004, DPAA has identified on average 72 sets of remains per year. At this rate, due to environmental conditions that accelerate decomposition the vast majority will likely never be discovered. Ideally, a joint effort between DPAA and Kuentai-USA will be established to help alleviate this problem.

When the guns fell silent after the end of WWI, our nation sought to memorialize those who had served in the war. However, as time marched on some of those memorials are now less remembered. A student-veteran from the University of Richmond is trying to fix that. Jeff Karow, who spent time in the Wisconsin Army National Guard and is now a college senior majoring in history, is conducting such a project as part of his undergraduate research requirements. He saw an opportunity to bring back to life a war that is fading from memory with the passing of the last American veteran of this conflict.

Jeff reached out to the Virginia VFW in hopes that our organization could help. Considering that VFW Virginia has one of the most active committees for student-veterans in the VFW, it should be no surprise that the Department would support and encourage a project like this. "Building memorials is part of our mission as an organization but there is a need to not forget those which we build" said Virginia State Commander Doug Keller. Under British rule, outdoor meetings were considered illegal and

many of the trees were cut down by British troops to undermine morale of the people. The nation's last surviving Liberty Tree died in 1999 of old age.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower wanted to remember veterans of the Korean War and urged citizens to plant Liberty Trees as a lasting memory to those who served in what is now known as "the forgotten war."

Also attending the ceremony were Brondwyn Walker Sheffield, daughter of the late Landis Walker, Commander of Post 10840 in 2004; Malon Shelton, Past Commander; Ronnie Haskins, Surgeon; and Andre Perry, Service Officer. #### TRICARE young adult premiums to increase

The TRICARE Health Plan has announced the 2016 premiums for TRICARE Young Adult Prime and Standard options covering beneficiaries between 23 and 26 years old. These premiums are adjusted on an annual basis and go into effect Jan. 1, 2016.

For 2016, the monthly premium for TYA Prime is \$306 per month, and TYA Standard is \$228 per month. TRICARE is required to set these premiums to cover the full cost of health care received by TYA beneficiaries. For the first time since TYA was created in 2011, TRICARE has sufficient statistically valid cost data to set annual premiums.

TYA Prime or Standard are options for eligible young adult beneficiaries, who are encouraged to explore all of their health care choices and pick the plan best suited to their needs.

With premiums competitive to similar plans, TRICARE Young Adult is comparable to available platinum-level health care plans. Other health care options for young adult beneficiaries include:

- •Purchasing TYA Standard lower premiums, higher cost shares instead of TYA Prime
- •Enrolling in a parent's civilian health insurance plan, if available
- •Purchasing a plan offered through the Health Insurance Marketplace at www.healthcare.gov
- •Purchasing coverage through the college or university, if enrolled

Lower cost plans may be available depending on income and residence, and assistance paying premiums may be available. Beneficiaries may also qualify for Medicaid. Go to <a href="https://www.healthcare.gov">www.healthcare.gov</a> to evaluate eligibility and options. Open enrollment for the Health Insurance Marketplace begins Nov. 1 and runs through Jan. 31, 2016.
