Delegate Helmer,

On behalf of the 32,335 members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States Department of Virginia (VFW), I am pleased to announce our support for HB 2020, a bill relating to the nomination of candidates for elected office, which would support those members of the U.S. military who seek to serve the Commonwealth while also serving in uniform. This legislation is important as every service member goes where they are sent to serve but when a deployment ends should not be the deciding factor in their quest to run for public office.

The Commonwealth of Virginia has a long history of its citizens serving in both the Reserve and National Guard components of the military while also holding higher office. Serving in the military means protecting the right of citizens to decide who gets the nomination of their party. Further, this bill does not intrude on the ability of parties to decide their nomination method nor does it change the outcome of any election which, in our opinion, simply leaves the door open to someone who wants to seek the nomination. In many ways, this bill defends the American system of elections by protecting access to the nomination process for all eligible citizens. Again, thank you for putting this bill forward and please know that you have our support for it.

HOUSE BILL NO. 2020

Offered January 13, 2021

Prefiled January 12, 2021

A BILL to amend and reenact § [24.2-509](#) of the Code of Virginia, relating to nomination of candidates for elected offices; restrictions on nomination method selected by political party.

Patrons-- Helmer, Scott and Hurst

Referred to Committee on Privileges and Elections

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia:

1. That § [24.2-509](#) of the Code of Virginia is amended and reenacted as follows:
§ [24.2-509](#). Party to determine method of nominating its candidates for office; exceptions.

A. The duly constituted authorities of the state political party shall have the right to determine the method by which a party nomination for a member of the United States Senate or for any statewide office shall be made. The duly constituted authorities of the political party for the district, county, city, or town in which any other office is to be filled shall have the right to determine the method by which a party nomination for that office shall be made. *A method of nomination shall not be selected if such method will have the practical effect of excluding participation in the nominating process by qualified voters who are unable to attend meetings because they are (i) a member of a uniformed service, as defined in § [24.2-452](#), on active duty; (ii) temporarily residing outside of the United States; (iii) a student attending a school or institution of higher education; (iv) a person with a disability; or (v) a person who has a communicable disease of public health threat as defined in § [32.1-48.06](#) or who may have come in contact with a person with such disease. However, such restriction shall not apply when selecting a candidate for a special election or nominating a candidate pursuant to § [24.2-539](#), or in the event that no candidate files the required paperwork by the deadline prescribed in § [24.2-522](#).*

B. Notwithstanding subsection A, the following provisions shall apply to the determination of the method of making party nominations. A party shall nominate its candidate for election for a General Assembly district where there is only one incumbent of that party for the district by the method designated by that incumbent, or absent any designation by him by the method of nomination determined by the party. A party shall nominate its candidates for election for a General Assembly district where there is more than one incumbent of that party for the district by a primary unless all the incumbents consent to a different method of nomination. A party, whose candidate at the immediately preceding election for a particular office other than the General Assembly (i) was nominated by a primary or filed for a primary but was not opposed and (ii) was elected at the general election, shall nominate a candidate for the next election for that office by a primary unless all incumbents of that party for that office consent to a different method.

When, under any of the foregoing provisions, no incumbents offer as candidates for reelection to the same office, the method of nomination shall be determined by the political party.

For the purposes of this subsection, any officeholder who offers for reelection to the same office shall be deemed an incumbent notwithstanding that the district which he represents differs in part from that for which he offers for election.

2. That the provisions of this act shall become effective on January 1, 2024.

VFW Post 2894 Chesapeake Honors Community Public Service Workers

Post Honors State Trooper of the Year. The Post's annual awards ceremony was cancelled due to the Wuhan flu so we have had to arrange for independent awards ceremonies. On 5 August, we were able to hold a ceremony to recognize and award our Post "State Trooper of the Year." This was our second ever such award and we presented it at the State Trooper Barracks in Chesapeake. This year's awardee was Special Agent Accountant Austin Pittman. He was born at Royal Air Force base Mildenhall in England, and is an Air Force "military brat". He attended six different schools for primary/secondary education and graduated from Tabb HS in York County and Longwood University. He joined the VSP in 2004 and was also a canine officer with his German Shepherd partner, "Haro". Trooper Pittman was promoted to Special agent and assigned to Chesapeake in 2014. He has made over 75 arrests related to financial crime since arriving in Chesapeake. Council member Debbie Ritter was also on hand to share in this recognition. We made a \$200 donation in his name to the Virginia State Police Association's Teddy Bear Program which provides teddy bears to state troopers to give out to traumatized children at accident or crime scenes.

Post Honors Deputy Sheriffs of the Year.

Post 2894 normally recognizes a single awardee in each category of Public Service but this year was special because two deputies equally earned the accolade. In November 2019, Deputies Quitez Burke and Ronald Hastings, Jr., came across a multiple vehicle accident involving an overturned 18-wheeler and a tour bus in the Afton Mountains. They secured the scene, helped evacuate the tour bus, and freed the driver of the 18-wheeler who was pinned in the cab of his vehicle! On Thursday, 27 August, comrades Jim Ireland and Carl Dozier presented plaques to the two deputies, recognizing them as the Post's "Deputies of the Year." Congratulations to these heroes!

Post Honors Fire Department Awardees. On Wednesday, 26 August, Post representatives handed out awards to members of the Chesapeake Fire Department (CFD) in a ceremony at Station 12 in Western Branch. Junior Vice Commander Bob Gregory, Service Officer Jim Ireland, and Past Commander Carl Dozier, along with Fire Chief Elliott and members of the Command Staff participated in the ceremony. Lt Waistel Kelley was our EMS Provider of the Year and FF Timothy Livingston was our Firefighter of the Year. In addition, FF/PM Richard Gray was presented with the National VFW Paramedic of the Year Award – the Post's fifth national public servant award in five years! Congratulations to all who were recognized and for their continued dedication to the City of Chesapeake. The ceremony was followed by a sit-down breakfast with the firefighters.

Post Middle School Teacher of the Year. At our Post meeting on 9 September, we recognized and awarded our 2019-20 Middle School Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Virginia “Ginny” Corbett, of Hugo Owens MS. Ginny is in her 21st year of teaching and is strongly involved in the Military Child Club, which supports students

who have parents serving in the military. She engages her students in all aspects of Civics: including historical documents leading to the Declaration of Independence, Constitution and its Amendments.

She stresses the importance of Citizenship, its rights and responsibilities, and the positive character traits of citizens through simulations. Among civic duties she discusses is the military draft and she has each class propose a Bill to include women in the draft and debate if the draft is still necessary in today’s times. She routinely has students create their own political parties allowing them to produce platforms using current events and teaches them to respect ideas that are different from their own. Ginny brings her subject to life and believes it is her duty to instill pride and love for one’s country, one child at a time. Congratulations!

Post Honors Local Veteran Business Owner.

Also at our September Post meeting, we took time to recognize Troy Hare, owner/operator of Hare’s Heating, Cooling and Electrical, who fixed the A/C for an elderly Korean War veteran who had been without it since May. She was covered with heat sores when we found out about her and the Post purchased a small unit to cool one room but it wasn’t enough. Troy’s repair of her A/C very likely saved her life this as summer was extremely hot. The total value of his work and a ‘used’ system would have cost over \$2,500. If we had to buy a new system it would have been much more. He donated his labor and



reduced the cost to \$800. We received assistance from Posts 4411 and 3160 and presented him with a check for \$500 (along with a Home Depot card worth more than \$331). Troy has also found a company to donate a new air handler which is dented and unable to be sold. He will also look for a donated – or at least buy at a reduced cost – 2½ ton A/C unit and will install them both for her when the weather cools. She will have a totally new system! Troy is a veteran and will be joining the Post. Incredibly, he turned around and gave back the check we presented him and told us to use it on another needy vet! Thank you, Thank You, THANK YOU!

TRICARE Select Enrollment Fee to Start Jan. 1

DOD announced that TRICARE Select Group A retirees will be required to pay an enrollment fee beginning on Jan. 1, 2021. Congress directed the Defense Health Agency in the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017 to implement TRICARE Select retiree enrollment fees, but delayed the implementation. Group A is comprised of retirees and their family members if the sponsor's initial enlistment or appointment occurred before Jan. 1, 2018. The enrollment fee is waived for medically retired individuals and their family members, and for survivors of active-duty deaths. During [TRICARE Open Season](#), running now to Dec. 14, beneficiaries must set up an allotment with their regional contractors for the enrollment fee to begin on Jan. 1, 2021. Beneficiaries who do not set up their allotment by the deadline will be unenrolled due to nonpayment. These individuals would have previously had 90 days from the termination date to request reinstatement. However, recently the Defense Health Agency has agreed to extend the reinstatement period to 180 days.

The following resolution was submitted by Manassas Post 7589 for consideration at the next State Convention.

SUPPORT THE UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE

WHEREAS, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States (VFW) is the oldest Congressionally chartered Veterans Service Organization (VSO), in the United States, and

WHEREAS, the Postal Service pre-dates the founding of the United States, the first Postmaster General, Benjamin Franklin, having been appointed by the Continental Congress in 1775, and;

WHEREAS, it is the duty of VSOs to support current and former members of the United States Armed Forces in whatever ways practical, and;

WHEREAS, the American public has come to rely upon the United States Postal Service (USPS) as an essential and indispensable means of communication and commerce, even in an increasingly electronic world, and;

WHEREAS, millions of military members, retirees, survivors, and beneficiaries depend upon the USPS to deliver life sustaining medications through Federal Government programs, established through the Departments of Defense, Veterans Affairs, and Health and Human Services, and;

WHEREAS, the United States Armed Forces rely upon the USPS to deliver, around-the-world, the critical spare parts needed to enable, restore, and sustain war-fighting capabilities, and;

WHEREAS, uniformed service-members stationed at sea and ashore on all seven continents continue to rely upon the USPS as the sole means of exercising their right to vote in elections, through absentee ballot, the loss of which would disenfranchise them from the very freedoms that they are serving and sacrificing to protect, and;

WHEREAS, pronouncements, political posturing, and thinly veiled disdain for the USPS have led to threats to delay the mails and reduce enabling funds for this essential institution; THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the VFW encourages the President of the United States to include adequate funding in the national budget to sustain and further modernize the USPS and; BE IT FURTHER

RESOLVED, that the VFW enjoins Congress to adequately fund the USPS to provide timely, dependable, and secure delivery of the mails, and; BE IT FURTHER

RESOLVED, that the VFW demands that those entrusted with the stewardship of the USPS be free from compromising conflicts of interest that could inhibit the faithful and efficient fulfillment of their duties to the American armed forces and public.

The second half of the ceremony took place in Post 4809's Canteen, where VFW National Assistant Adjutant General Kim DeShano offered a speech that honored the fallen and raised the spirits of the veterans and the other VFW members present. Upon his speech's conclusion, every attendee was led to the building's cafeteria, where a dinner was provided. During this dinner, many long-time members, as well as newer members, offered their honest opinions pertaining to the event, comparing and contrasting it with previous versions.

Tim Dawley, past commander of Post 4809 and Cootie Pup Tent 2 Seam, compared the event to the previous year's event. During this incarnation, a lecture took place to inform all attendees of the significance of the event as a whole. Dawley has a long history with the VFW, having visited many Posts before finding a home at Post 4809. Many of its members are people Dawley works with, offering him chemistry that is more organic. The primary message he hopes this event will always convey is the unyielding loyalty all members have to each other and their dedication to their families, should they ever be in need of assistance.



Kathy Goodall, the first female commander of Post 4809, and Dave Alexander, Post 4809's current commander, additionally noted how National POW/MIA Recognition Day is celebrated differently each year. For instance, in previous years the ceremony would have consisted of a reading to recognize the fallen, or it would have been more interactive. In the past the ceremony regarding the POW/MIA table was such that every member had a different duty pertaining to its assembly thus showcasing the importance of each item to the VFW.

One of the many takeaways of the event, as observed by Post 4809's Auxiliary Chaplain Ronald Riffle III, was the sight of so many individuals of various branches coming together to pay their respects to those who have fallen and to deeply recognize their sacrifice for the country they all loved. The ceremony also consisted of a flag raising that was acknowledged by approximately twenty attendees.

The gathering for this year's event differed, as typically the POW and MIA event for Post 4809 would have a small attendance. That was not the case this year, as more than sixty people attended.

This event is held by many VFW Posts and Districts across the country and celebrated in a multitude of ways unique to their respective Districts. According to Tim Dawley, who attended District 2's commemoration as well, their event was well executed. Michael R. Chism, Department of Virginia chairman of the POW Committee, led the District 2 event and collaborated with the various Posts within the District to erect a granite sculpture of an empty chair at Albert G. Horton Veterans Cemetery in Suffolk, VA. This gesture is meant to honor the MIA's and POW's memories in the same fashion as the POW/MIA chair at Post 4809. This was one of many examples Dawley provided to describe the ways in which the event was celebrated.

Warrenton VFW Post 9835 Presents VOD , PP & Teacher of the Year Awards

VFW Post 9835 presented awards ... to middle and high school students who excelled in writing or performing essays. Middle school students in the annual National VFW Student Essay competition Patriot's Pen were asked to submit a typewritten essay of between 300 and 400 words on the topic "What is patriotism to me?" High school students entering the Voice of Democracy competition submitted a 3- to 5-minute recorded essay on the topic "Is this the country the founders envisioned?" Entries were evaluated by several judging panels last month and Post winners advance to district, state and national competitions.

On Dec. 11, VFW Post Commander Jeff Dombroff and Auxiliary President Kathleen Bilger were at Wakefield School in The Plains to present medals, certificates and checks to students who wrote the top three Patriot's Pen entries; the Post received more than 60 entries. The winners, all of whom attend Wakefield School, were eighth-grader Leah Kim (third place); seventh-grader Tyler Kim (second place) and eighth-grader Ava Price (first place). Price earned second place honors last year.

On Saturday, awards were presented to the top finishers in the Voice of Democracy competition. Family members and teachers met in the parking lot of the former Warrenton Visitor Center to witness Seaton School 11th -grader Jordan Kach (third place); Fresta Valley student Colleen Stow (second place); and Southeastern Alternative School senior Tyler Kelley (first place) receive their awards. Kelley was also informed that his entry had been forwarded to the District 8 competition, where it took top honors. Kelley now represents the 8th District at state-level judging, where the essay will be judged on Dec. 19 against the top entries from the other 12 VFW Districts in the Commonwealth. The Post also recognized Wakefield upper class history teacher Peter Findler as its Citizenship Education Teacher of the Year. Besides his classroom work, which stimulates his students to embrace the country and its history, Findler was singled out for his creation of and overseeing the 9:57 project. The program connects schools and veterans in a recognition of 9/11 courage, resilience and sacrifice. The name recognizes the time when the crew of American Airlines Flight 93 chose to fight back. Findler's entry also took first place in District 8 and is competing for the state title later this month.
